Mr. Sunday Nana, his wife and four small children live in Koko Village, Nigeria. The village is like any other African village-picturesque, colourful and noisy. The Nana family's house, too, is the same as all the other houses in the village, with mud walls and a rusting corrugated iron roof and with children and chickens sharing the compound.

There is one difference, however. Outside Mr. Nana's front are three large empty metal drums, the bright red paint now flaking away, but the skull and crossbones symbol clearly visible on each. And in a clearing 200m away from the village, next to a stream that the villagers get their drinking water from, is an enormous pyramid of identical drums, reaching to the sky. Some of them are badly corroded, their slimy contents of various colours - grey, dark green, bright orange, etc. - leaking out, down, on to the baked African earth and into the stream. Some have fallen down and rolled - or been rolled by playful children - into the bush. Some are smoking in the midday heat. Some are swelling, as if their contents are bursting to get out. Some have already burst.

"They came on a Wednesday", said Sunday, "Many, many big lorries". They took all day unloading them. No-one told us what was in them. They gave the Chief a brown paper bag-I saw him smiling as the lorries drove away. This was five years ago. Then three months ago, one of the brightest boys in the village-Thomas Agonyo - started university in Lagos. He came home one weekend with a new Chemistry book and spent all day looking at the drums and writing things down and talking to himself and shaking his head. We all thought he had gone mad. Then he called a meeting of the village and told us that the drums contained poisonous chemicals. He said they had come from Italy. But I don't know where that is. Is it in Europe?

Mr. Sunday Nana stopped, frowning, a troubled look on his face, "In the last five years, 13 people have died in this village, my own elder brother being one of them. They have been in pain, terrible pain. We have never seen deaths like that before. Lots of our children are sick. We have asked the government to take the drums away, but they do nothing. We have written to Italy, but they do nothing. The Chief says we should move our houses to another place. But we have no money to buy land. We have no choice. We have to stay here. And they" ... pointing to the mountain of death in the clearing - "are our neighbours".

"I can remember the time." she said wistfully, "when all the fields around this village were green and the harvests good. Her outstretched arm described a complete circle as she stood in the morning sun. Then they built those monsters, those...". Her voice spluttered in anger as she shook her fist at a collection of ominous-looking black buildings on the horizon, covered in a low-lying shroud of thick smoke. "They said that factories need leather to make shoes, handbags and clothes. They said our menfolk would get jobs. They said we would all become rich." We stood silent, each thinking our own thoughts. Yes, they told you all that. But there is so much they didn't tell you. They didn't tell you that to change animal skins into leather - which they call tanning - uses as many as 250 different chemicals, including heavy metals such as cadmium, arsenic and chromium. They didn't tell you that these chemicals are discharged into the environment from those chimney stacks and fall to earth for miles around, polluting the earth below. They didn't tell you that this would poison your fields, so that nothing will grow.

"They didn't tell us that the chemicals would be dumped in open fields and into our rivers", sighed Vijayasama. We had been thinking the same thoughts. "They didn't tell us that our women would have to walk ten kilometers every day. They didn't tell us that we would get ulcer and sores on our bodies. They didn't tell us..." Her voice trailed off. There is so much they didn't tell you, I thought.

Read the following telephonic conversation between Nidhi and Ayushi.

Nidhi: Hello Ayushi, how're you doing?

Ayushi: Hello! I am good. How about you?

Nidhi: I'm fine too. How're you coping with Delhi pollution?

Ayushi: It's really terrible, especially in winter months. I recently bought a pollution mask to mitigate the effect of pollution, but you can't wear it all the time. But what to do at home?

Nidhi: Air purifiers. Don't they work well?

Ayushi: They do, but they aren't affordable for everyone. Moreover, would you want to run them for so many hours every day and for so many months?

Nidhi: You've got a point. I'm also planning to buy a pollution mask. What would you recommend?

Ayushi: I bought an N99 mask which cost me just over INR 2,000/-. I've tried the cheap ones as well - the ones that cost 15-20 rupees a piece - but they actually turn out to be more expensive.

Nidhi: More expensive? How?

Ayushi: The cheap ones can at best be used 2-3 times. Whereas, the one I'm using can be used for a few hundred hours. So the cost of cheap ones add up fast. But more importantly, the cheap one's aren't as effective as the N99 I'm using to filter the pollutants. That's critical, right. What's the point of using a mask if it's not filtering the harmful pollutants?

Nidhi: Agree. Anything else on pollution masks?

Ayushi: Prefer a mask with exhalation valves. Valves help you exhale easily, especially when you're out of breath after walking fast or climbing stairs, and prevent buildup of moisture.

Nidhi: We've been breathing the toxic air for the last few years. Do you for see any abatement in pollution levels in the near future, say this winter?

Ayushi: I think it'll be marginal at best. Vehicular pollution can be controlled by taking the fuel-efficient, polluting old vehicles off the roads, but how will it happen? Who is going to bell the cat to control stubble burning in the neighbouring states? Construction activity is probably the easiest of the three to control.

Nidhi: I agree with your points, but I think citizens too have some role in curbing pollution.

Ayushi: Yes, of course. Citizens can play an important role too. We can stop or report people from burning polythene bags and other hazardous waste in water. We can also report construction activities in our neighbourhood during the period it is banned.

Nidhi: True. What we often don't pay attention is to the fact that pollution, especially in the winter months is not just a Delhi phenomenon. It grips most of North India. In fact, the Air Quality Index (AQI) of smaller cities such as Gwalior, Agra and Lucknow often gets worse than Delhi's, and they don't get the same coverage in the national media as big cities like Delhi do.

Ayushi: You've summed up the state of affairs quite well. Let's hope things improve.

Nidhi: Hope so. Come over to my place for dinner on the weekend.

Ayushi: Sure. I will be there to enjoy your company. Bye, see you soon.
